The event began with a profound territory acknowledgment by Elder Carleen Thomas, followed by insightful Opening Remarks from Monique Nelson, *pos*Abilities' Director of Community Engagement.

The show kicked off with the enchanting melodies of the members: Cheri Maracle, Sherryl Sewepagaham & Kaitlyn Yott of M'Girl band, which delivered a proud and elegant performance with two traditional Hand-drum songs. Their graceful opening set the stage for an evening of rich cultural experiences.

A touching and inspiring moment unfolded during the screening of 'Minding My Own Business: Entrepreneurs with Down Syndrome', presented by the Down Syndrome Resource Foundation. This powerful film showcased the resilience and determination of individuals like Andrew, Anu, and Zamaan, as they navigated the journey of establishing successful businesses despite the challenges they faced. Their



nges they faced. Their stories conveyed a powerful message of perseverance and determination, inspiring everyone in attendance. The Hip-hop Inclusive All Bodies dance performance was a celebration of the vibrant hip-hop culture, featuring diverse expressions through urban street dance, performed by Kelly, together with Stew, Kevin, Shawn, Alyssa, Aris, and Bruce who cochoreographed the dance performance. The performance not only entertained but also fostered inclusivity and freedom of expression, leaving the audience exhilarated. One of the highlights of the event was the screening of 'Chicken,' an award-winning short film directed by Lucy and Emma. This touching film delved into themes of family, love, and overcoming life's obstacles, offering a poignant and inspiring narrative. Aaron, the film's lead actor, shared heartwarming experiences about the making of the film, adding depth to the audience's appreciation of the story. The electrifying rock music performance by Luc Picard, Dean Williams, and Andrew Macfarlane had the audience dancing and singing along. Their enthusiasm and dedication to music were evident, leaving an enduring impression on the evening. Their commitment to Rock4Autism promotes awareness about neurodiversity, uniting creative talents across diverse spectrums.

### **Translink: Access Transit Programs**

Taking public transit is not only an eco-friendly way to go about town, but a necessity for countless individuals within our communities. For those with disabilities, a solo transit route means more than getting from place to place; it promotes a sense of independence, freedom, and access to the broader world. Yet, some individuals struggle with the intricate logistics surrounding transit.

Recognizing this challenge, TransLink's Access Transit Program has forged partnerships with various community groups to introduce Travel Training. Travel Training offers large group workshops to teach the skills necessary for students to confidently travel alone. Within their training, students learn the basics of trip planning and how to take the bus and SkyTrain. Afterwards, teachers follow students on a practice route until they can ride unsupervised. Train the Trainer workshops are also available to staff and volunteers who support seniors or people with disabilities.

In addition, TransLink also offers various online tools to feel confident on your next route. Included in their Access Transit resources are mobility guide training videos, a 3-D virtual bus tour, and a concise access transit travel guide (provided in English, Chinese, and Punjabi). Training videos are available in English with American Sign Language (ASL), Described Video, Cantonese, French, Mandarin, and Punjabi. # Advocates Continue to Press for Equitable Access to Quality Supports

In 2023, advocates continued to work tirelessly to advance the human rights and dignity of persons with disabilities of all ages, ethnicities, and creeds. For that, I am truly grateful. I would like to take a moment to recognize the meaningful contributions of the selfadvocate community, family leaders, not-for-profit organizations, and member-driven associations like **Inclusion BC**, the **Federation of Community Social Services of BC**, the **BC Non-Profit Housing Association**, the **Family Support Institute of BC (FSI)** and **PLAN**.

Each of these organizations has played a vital role in centering the voices of the persons whom we serve in places of power - at all levels of government. We can also be proud of the sector's progress in working alongside first peoples and their organizations, and with intercultural community groups to create culturally safer and more appropriate supports.

One other issue that is top of mind, is access to affordable housing. **Community Living BC** and others in our sector are entering into partnership with housing providers, developers, funders, municipalities and others service organizations to become part of the solution. Together, we all aspire to create more homes, and to provide any supports that are needed to ensure that tenancies/home living arrangements are stable and successful for the long term. # **Calls to Action**

FSI's **Family Voices Project** is conducting meaningful engagement with the community to inform the work of the Ministry of Children and Family Development (MCFD). This project is part of a <u>larger effort</u> by the Province of British Columbia to redesign and improve services for children and youth with support needs (CYSN).

For this project, FSI will be focusing on four groups: families of complex kids, transitioning youth, families of kids with dual diagnosis, and self-advocates. FSI's engagement process aims to be culturally appropriate and mindful of the access needs of diverse groups. This research project is conducted in collaboration with the UBC Canadian Institute for Inclusion and Citizenship (CIIC). # Why a National Caregiving Strategy?

Did you know... "If every caregiver in this country took a week off, Canadians would experience the collapse of our care systems before noon of the first day?" This is a statistic that you may have heard from the Executive Director of the Canadian Centre for Caregiving Excellence, Liv Mendelsohn. It's in reference to the fact that caregivers deliver roughly three hours of care for every hour provided through our health-care, disability and social support systems. This festive season, I invite you to check out their website to see what kind of support, training or advocacy they are undertaking that could be of interest to you and your loved ones.

Canada is a nation of caregivers: a daughter helping her mother stay healthy and active in a long-term care home; a brother supporting his sibling with developmental disabilities; a young adult supporting a grandparent with dementia; a neighbour supporting a friend with chronic health issues. One in four Canadians is a caregiver – and for women, <u>it's one</u> <u>in two</u>.

Canadian family caregivers work 5.7 billion hours per year supporting the people in their lives. This is equivalent to 3 million full-time care providers. This division of labour saves the country billions in healthcare resources – <u>triple the national expenditures</u> <u>on home, community and long-term care</u>. Yet, as our senior population grows from 6 to 9.5 million between 2014 and 2030, there will be 30 per cent fewer close family members available to care for them.

This my friends, is why we need a national caregiving strategy. To be effective, the strategy must include a broad and comprehensive set of policy responses that meet the needs of today and tomorrow. It would include things like a review of financial support (e.g., tax credits), the integration and coordination of services across sectors (e.g., community living and health), and fair, flexible conditions for employed caregivers and care providers. A national caregiving strategy is a good place to start.
